■ Introduction – Sealing Faith Memory Studies

In a world falling apart, we see selfish, ease-loving, panic-stricken people who fear tall giants and inaccessible walls clamoring for retreat. God calls for Calebs who will press to the front. Leaders who with courageous words will make a strong report in favor of immediate action. Men and women who will not fear the highest pinnacle, but will cry with Caleb, "Give me this mountain!"

You and I have been chosen by God to stand apart from the worldly weaklings to have a faith that moves mountains. That kind of faith comes from the Word of God. Only extraordinary faith united with extraordinary prayer brings the kind of power needed to finish the work. These memory cards contain God's own Words to produce both.

We hide these Words in our hearts to become an Esther, who has come to the Kingdom for such a time as this. The engrafted Word brings Jacob's experience to forsake every sin and pray long and earnestly for God's blessing. Through the memorized Word, we meet the enemy like David, not with a sword, a spear, and a shield: but in the name of the Lord of hosts, the God of the armies of Israel. As our lives display His power, the people fall before Him as at Mt. Carmel to cry, "The Lord, He is the God! The Lord, He is the God!"

That's the action needed as we behold the abuse and crime, wars and fightings, famine and disasters that abound on all sides. To give God power to prepare us to play our part, we begin today to place these Old Testament studies in our hearts.

First, repeat the Scripture text of the first lesson, The Creation, Genesis 2:1-25. Remember that these words are God's Words to us just as surely as if He spoke them with His voice. Ask Him for insight to the meaning and for help in learning. Read through the whole study, then to start memorizing, read only the first verse. Practice with first-letter helps—reviewing any word you can't recall. As soon as you can recite this verse with no help, read the second verse, then practice it with first-letter helps. Proceed until you can recite the first two verses with no help. Using the same process, continue with as many verses as you can successfully remember. Don't be discouraged if it's only one. However many, carry the words in your mind all day while you contemplate the insight they impart and hold them before the Lord as a prayer.

Constant review is necessary to place the verses in your permanent memory bank. Also, along with your review plan, every day read and pray through the study that corresponds to the day of the month. This brings keener insight and easier learning to new studies.

Love floods our souls as we see our Heavenly Father offering Jesus in Genesis 22: "And Abraham raised his hand to slay his son." Our hearts burn in worship for the Saviour, who on Calvary made Judah's plea: "How can I go back to my father and not take him with me?" We marvel at the Saviour's prayer spoken by Moses in the idolatry at Sinai, "If Thou wilt, forgive their sin, and if not, blot me, I pray Thee, out of Thy book."

Because of the power released from the Word and made active in our lives, we go forth in faith and love with the prayer of Caleb on our lips: "Give me this mountain!"

"And the mountain shall remove, and nothing shall be impossible unto you!"

He did all that human energy could do, and then he cried in faith for divine aid. The secret of success is the union of divine power with human effort. Those who achieve the greatest results are those who rely most implicitly upon the Almighty Arm. The man who commanded, 'Sun, stand thou still upon Gibeon; and thou, Moon, in the valley of Ajalon,' is the man who for hours lay prostrate upon the earth in prayer in the camp at Gilgal. The men of prayer are the men of power." PP509

He did not ask for himself a land already conquered, but the place which above all others the spies had thought it impossible to subdue. By the help of God he would wrest his stronghold from the very giants whose power had staggered the faith of Israel. It was no desire for honor or aggrandizement that prompted Caleb's request. The brave old warrior was desirous of giving to the people an example that would honor God, and encourage the tribes fully to subdue the land which their fathers had deemed unconquerable." PP512-3
